#### **Little Acorns Pre-Nursery**

Hello and a very warm welcome back to you all. It's been so lovely to welcome the children back after the Easter break and hear about all of their adventures!

This week in Little Acorns we have welcomed some new children into the nursery. We have been reminding ourselves of our rules and daily routines. The children have been excellent at welcoming our new friends and helping them learn our daily songs.

This week we began our new topic 'Why do spiders eat flies?' We have begun to look at different minibeasts, learning their names and talking about how they look - do they have patterns on them? What colour they are and thinking about where we would find them.

Outside we have used our 'bug hunting' sheet to help us identify any minibeasts we might find!

We now have lots of little people in our nursery so please do make sure all clothing and water bottles are clearly named.

#### Acorn (Nursery am and pm)

Welcome back. This term our topic is 'Why Do Spiders Eat Flies?'. We have talked about what we already know about spiders and have made a list of the things we want to find out. We have read the story of Spinderella, the spider in a school. We enjoyed hunting for spiders in our own school.

In maths, we have been learning how to order our numbers to 10 and trying to recognise numbers out of sequence. Can your child find any numbers when they are out in the village?

We have carried out a science experiment this week to find out what materials would help keep the spider at the top of his drainpipe!! Ask your child what material would be best to use.

We have also enjoyed making our own spiders to decorate our nursery.

#### **Maple and Beech News (Reception)**

We have started our new topic, 'Quests and Journeys' with Michael Rosen's - We're Going on a Bear Hunt, which the children have loved. They have made story maps, acted the story out using characters in the small world and been on our own bear hunt in outdoor learning. Everyone has also enjoyed making binoculars and finding the hidden bears in the classroom.

In Geography, we have been using positional language to describe routes and give directions to our friends. This then helped us to program instructions into a Beebot to help him move where we wanted him to go.

In Maths, we have been exploring numbers between 10 and 20. We have found out what they look like using cubes, numicon shapes and counters on tens frames as well as how the numerals are written.

Our Author of the term is Beatrix Potter, we started to learn about her in History last term and we will be reading more of her books.

#### **Birch and Cherry (Year 1)**

We've had a fantastic start to our new topic, Dinosaurs, with an incredible trip to Oxford Natural History Museum. It was such a pleasure to be able to take the children on their very first school trip. A big thanks to all of the children who were a credit to the school, and an extra thanks to our parent helpers. We got to see lots of different dinosaur skeletons, touch dinosaur bones, T-Rex teeth and even fossilised poo! We saw huge skeletons and tiny ones, and skeletons of herbivores, omnivores and carnivores. It was a brilliant day out!

As well as learning lots of science information at the museum, we have worked in school to identify animals that are carnivores, herbivores and omnivores. I wonder if your child can remember what these definitions mean? Which one means a plant (nuts, seeds, berries) eater, which means they eat meat and which means they can eat a mixture of meat (from other animals) and plant material?

Our English / history focus has been to order and talk about the evolution of dinosaurs from small cells. We learnt that the first animals on Earth were in the sea and then gradually we had amphibians that were able to walk on land and then eventually reptiles of the land, sea and air (many of which are what we call dinosaurs). We learnt that the word dinosaur means 'terrible lizard'.

In maths, we have been taught to understand multiplication through repeated addition of groups of pictures. We have mainly focused on multiples of 10 and 5, so see if your child can count forwards and backwards in 5's and 10's. Can they also say how many 10's or 5's are in a given number e.g. 40 (4 tens, 8 fives).

Please can we also just remind you that children need to have shorts in their P.E. kit (not just because the weather is warmer, but for safety reasons, we do not allow wearing of trousers for indoor gymnastics). Thank you for your continued support.

#### Hazel and Rowan (Year 2)

It has been a lovely first week back at school for year 2 and as usual we have been so busy with our learning! In maths, our new topic is time. The children have learnt to tell the time using language such as o'clock, half past, quarter past and quarter to. Some of them have even started learning to tell the time to the nearest 5 minutes! Ask your child if they can tell you how to work out what time is shown on an analogue clock.

In English, we have been reading and discussing stories about minibeasts. We compared stories, talked about our likes and dislikes and even re-wrote a well-known story in our own words. Next week, we will plan and write our own minibeast stories.

In science, the children have begun their new topic all about living things and their habitats. They have learnt how to identify living things and about the 7 life processes – movement, respiration, sensitivity, growth, reproduction, excretion and nutrition.

Finally, a plea - we are still short of adults for our trip to Thatcham Discovery Centre on the 12<sup>th</sup> of May; if you think you may be able to support us on this day, please speak to Miss Henly.
